
Workshops



David O'Rafferty

David will run a session on childhood trauma for those who have little or no understanding of the impact of trauma on the neurobiology of young people in care. He will explain the different types of trauma and how these impact the various regions of the brain.

David will also share some strategies on how to assist young people who have trauma-related behaviours, including de-escalating a potential situation and assisting a young person to focus on learning new strategies and manage their emotional responses.

Role plays and activities may be required as part of this session.

Effective Communication in 2020

Troy Forrest

In this interactive and upbeat workshop, participants will explore and practice communication skills that deliver desired results, and learn ways to successfully navigate the brave new world of digital communication.

Participants will work through the fundamentals of effective communication (including where & why it goes wrong), and explore the nuances of the communication mix (including audience, deliverer, content, context, vehicle, tone & timing, and how to tailor the mix to each situation). They will learn practical ways to harness the superpower of active listening, and develop tailored strategies to start new conversations with confidence, being both engaging and effective.

The workshop will cover some newer communication situations that present in an e-communicating world, including where & how different digital communication mechanisms can be employed to great effect (and how to avoid getting it horribly wrong). This exploration will also look at the challenges of inter-generational communication, and how Baby Boomers, Gen X'ers and Millennials can learn to understand and communicate better with one another.

Finally, the workshop will cover some practical tips and exercises participants can take away and employ to keep their communication skills sharp.

Belonging Together - building inclusive communities

One in five Australians live with disability (ABS 2015). Many of these people want to be connected into community and have the same opportunities to participate fully in community life.

The Connections Project is conducted by the Church Support team and funded by an NDIS ILC grant, co-designed inclusion guides and an accompanying workshop with people with disabilities and their carers. 'Belonging Together' highlights the opportunities and easy wins community services and churches can undertake to increase accessibility and inclusion, thereby creating genuine opportunities for people living with disability to fully participate and thrive.

The aim of the workshop is to:

- use the voice of people with disability to raise awareness of what our community can do to make active participation easier
- share stories, insights and ideas that promote inclusive communities because we are 'better together'
- provide an open forum to discuss ideas and strategies.

Importantly, we will explore the power that come from working cooperatively, of sharing resources and harnessing our shared motivation to see people live with dignity and hope.

Enhancing hope through significant change - a Holden case study

Hear the remarkable story of GM Holden and the way Jamie and his team transformed the leadership, improved business results and generated employee hope despite the closure of their manufacturing operations.

This raw, heartfelt session highlights the remarkable story of how they were able to turn Holden's manufacturing business from a bottom quartile performer to the number one GM facility in the world. This was at the same time as announcing to its workforce that it would close four years later and was able to transition 86% of its workforce into jobs after they left Holden. The key foundation of this success stemmed from a change in leadership style (prior to announcing closure) and the development of a best practice Transition Centre. This generated an incredibly positive culture where employees felt valued and had a future.

This session is currently being presented in thriving organisations (Mining, resources etc) around the world as it is not a lesson on closure and downsizing, but a story of how true leadership can make a difference. In particular, the session highlights a number of principles surrounding good culture, leadership change, change management, employee engagement, strategic foresight and a pure desire to put our people first.



Paul is currently Chief Executive of The Wyatt Trust, Chair of World Relief Australia and Executive Officer of Bright Futures Child Aid & Development Fund Australia. He has held a number of CEO and executive roles in the

homelessness, community and international development sectors.



Jamie is an award winning Senior HR Leader with a proven track record of achievement across Generalist and Specialist HR roles in a number of large multinational organizations. Before completing his HR degree, Jamie started his

career as a mechanical tradesman, which built a great foundation to his HR profession.

With GM Holden closing its manufacturing operations in Australia in 2017, he took on the leadership in the closure of the industry with a strong focus around change management and employee engagement principles. The key foundation of this support has been around the development of a best practice Transition Centre to support all employees in the auto industry receiving the support, advice and training to help them transition into new work.

As a result of the work in this area, Jamie was named as the Australian Leader/Manager of the year at the Australian Excellence Awards in 2017 and was a finalist in the Australian HR Institute's (AHRI) HR Director of the year awards 2017.

Measuring client outcomes using the Baptcare Quality of Life Framework

Baptist Care SA is a member of Baptist Care Australia (BCA), along with Baptcare (Victoria & Tasmania). Following a feasibility study, BCA has opted to adopt and implement a national approach to Outcomes Measurement based upon the Quality of Life Framework (BQOL) that has been developed by Baptcare. The BQOL was implemented in 2014 to provide a structural hierarchical framework for outcomes measurement across Baptcare.

This workshop will provide participants with an overview of the project implementation process of establishing outcomes measurement across the organisation. Participants will be introduced to the BQOL and the way in which Baptcare is using the BQOL to measure client outcomes across the market segments of Family and Community Services, Aged Care, Affordable Housing and Asylum seeker services. This session will provide a foundational understanding of the use of the BQOL in preparation for the national implementation of the framework over the next few years.



Ann is a Senior Researcher at Baptcare. Ann has a Bachelor of Social Science (Psychology) and Master of Family Studies (Intensive Family Practice). Ann has a

background in Family and Community Services, Child Protection and Specialist Homelessness Services. As part of her research activities, Ann has been actively involved in the implementation of an outcomes measurement framework at Baptcare since 2015 and has been involved in the scoping of the project directed by BCA to implement outcomes measurement nationally using the Baptcare Quality of Life Framework (BQOL).

Integration and partnership working across Baptist Care SA

This workshop will share with you what is already happening to achieve this; the introduction of the Client Pathways' System, and the client intake, referral and assessment model. More importantly, it will be an opportunity to hear from you; your ideas and what is already working well in your service area.

provided consultancy and is currently Project Manager Service Development at Baptist Care SA. Part of Rachel's current role is to develop and embed a practice framework that is focused on the provision of quality care and achieving positive outcomes for clients.



Andrew has been working at Baptist Care SA since May 2018 as Senior Business Analyst, Client Pathways System (CPS). NOT just about technology, this project considers people, processes as well as technology to help the organisation develop and enhance the journey of clients moving from adversity to opportunity. The CPS is a set of tools that can provide a common

approach to Care Plans, centralised client intake model and referral and assessment tools.

"The situation is hopeless, we must take the next step" so said Pablo Casals. Sometimes as we consider social, environmental and economic circumstances facing us, we may feel the temptation of despair. Are there ever situations beyond the reach of hope?
